Sudbury Forklift License - Obtaining a forklift license or forklift certification in North America would require the one training to do classroom instruction in addition to hands-on training. The provincial, federal and state regulatory bodies are responsible for the certification, training and licensing for powered industrial truck operators. Operators can acquire a license either by a third party or through training administered by the employer. In any case, regulatory requirements should be met. Recertification is required every two to three years.

Lift trucks are powered industrial trucks which come together with a variety of alternatives, like stand-up and sit-down. There are various sizes and types of forklift suitable for various industrial uses. Operator training programs are usually individualized to address the particular uses and kinds for which the operator is training. Training on a sit-down, gas-powered forklift in a warehouse surroundings would not be the same as training on a propane-powered, stand-up forklift within a shipyard. The variety of forklifts and their applications makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all businesses and machines. Regulatory standards, thus, have a tendency not to focus on particular course requirements but instead on the outcome of individual training courses.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common way for operators to receive their forklift license or certification. This method of certification requires the employer to provide classroom sessions and practical training on machines in the workplace. Employers could opt to train staff on each type of forklift separately, or to train them on all machinery combined. The curriculum incorporates forklift operation methods, company policies, forklift maintenance and safety measures. Subject matters particular to the worksite, such as dangerous conditions or materials, should be covered. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely utilize and operate each type of forklift on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor normally needs an on-site component along with hands-on practice.

Typically, an employer-provided certification would not transfer from the present employer to the next employer. Receiving a forklift license through employer-provided training allows the operator to run a lift truck for that employer only.

The most significant factor of forklift license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements vary from one kind of equipment to another. Safety problems differ from industry to industry and from employer to employer. Both third-party providers and employer-provided training may have to address extra requirements for safety training in applicable industries, like in offshore and marine operations.
